The Somerville Group: Influences, impact, and legacy

Lund University, Lund, Sweden 13-16 June 2025

Recently there has been a surge of interest in the so-called 'Somerville group', or 'quartet'—i.e. a group of philosophers including Gertrude Elizabeth Margaret Anscombe, Iris Murdoch, Mary Midgley and Philippa Foot. This conference aims to act as a platform for showcasing research about the Somerville philosophers, either as a group or as individuals in order to aid in the collective undertaking of surveying the state-of-the-art of current research and outline how to move forward. Topics might include, but are not limited to: the Somerville philosophers' predecessors and contemporaries, their influence and legacy, their usage of historical, or genealogical, modes of argument and use of history, their contributions—either individually or as a group—to moral philosophy, philosophy of mind, metaphysics, and other sub-fields of philosophical inquiry, as well as interventions in the ongoing debate about the benefits and potential pitfalls involved in regarding the four as a group. We also welcome contributions pertaining to the Somerville philosophers by scholars from outside philosophy and the history of philosophy such as for example intellectual history, gender studies, and comparative literature. Towards the History of a Heterodox Tradition in Analytic Philosophy: Transformative, Humanistic, Conversational

Vita-Salute San Raffaele University Milan, March 20th – 21st, 2025

Description:

A widespread impression is shared among scholars that a heterodox tradition can be found within contemporary analytic philosophy. It is reasonable to assume that such a tradition – characterized by family resemblances rather than by necessary and jointly sufficient conditions – exists and is well recognizable. However, its exact contours and nature are a matter of debate. This tradition is

often identified either by providing an open and incomplete list of authors – among them Cavell, Williams, Rorty, Bernstein, Margolis, Diamond, Murdoch, McDowell, MacIntyre, Wollheim, Brandom, Conant, the "later" Putnam, Foot, Winch, Midgley, Hampshire, Nussbaum, Mulhall, Shusterman, Price – or by concocting such labels as post-analytic philosophy, perfectionism, Wittgensteinian philosophy, post-Sellarsian thought, and philosophy as a humanistic discipline.

The present conference, organized in the context of a PRIN 2022 research project, originates from the conviction that, though useful, such labels do not allow one to write a comprehensive history of the heterodox tradition or to distinguish it from both the analytic mainstream and non-analytic or continental traditions. The conference is intended as a moment of reflection on the interpretative keys and methodological tools necessary to make such a history possible, as well as on significant case studies offered both by individual philosophers and wider currents of thought.

In a preliminary fashion, we propose as interpretative keys three main intertwined features that characterize the tradition under investigation:

- a) **Transformative Analysis**: Philosophy is a distinctive kind of therapeutic activity, which does not consist in providing a reductive or connective analysis of concepts in the abstract, but rather aims at concretely transforming the subject engaged in the philosophical investigation.
- b) **Humanistic Style**: The writing style has a genuine philosophical import and is no mere ornament. Form matters for philosophical content, as it does for other humanistic disciplines, in the measure in which the text addresses and challenges the reader rather than merely conveying a neutral message.
- c) **Conversational Stance**: Conversations are constitutive of philosophical activity in at least two senses: philosophy involves personal dialogues rather than impersonal truths, and it constructs itself through the exchange with other disciplines (such as art criticism, literary criticism, film studies, psychoanalysis, and the cognitive sciences) and with non-analytic philosophical traditions (most notably pragmatism, hermeneutics, existentialism, post-structuralism, feminism, Hegelianism, and Marxism).

The call for proposals encourages a variety of approaches and contributions on these and other sub-topics, addressing scholars in the fields of history of philosophy, ethics, aesthetics, political theory, philosophy of language, film studies, comparative literature, North American studies, gender studies, intellectual history, history of ideas, and digital humanities.

After the conference, we will also explore the possibility of composing a collection of essays.

We hope this email finds you well. We are Lucy Elvis and Michela Dianetti from the University of Galway. We are currently working on a project funded by the Irish Research Council entitled *AIRE Attentive Inquiry Reclaiming Environment*. The project uses Iris Murdoch's novel *The Unicorn* as a provocation to attend to our thinking about home, nature, transformational experiences and suffering.

The project has three phases:

- Communities of Inquiry reading groups
- An academic conference
- Public engagement through an exhibition and a *field guide to The Unicorn* (developed through phase one.)

We are contacting you to invite you to participate in creating a sound piece for the third phase of the project: an exhibition of new art and reproductions of archival material that examines Iris Murdoch's relationship with Ireland in the context of nature and the imagination.

We are incredibly excited to have been granted permission by the Iris Murdoch Archive to create a recording of an unpublished poem entitled *Music in Ireland*. For this, we are hoping that female and female-identifying Murdochians will lend us their voices by recording one of the drafts of the poem. This will become a sound work in which six lead voices are heard reading drafts of the poem which then layer with the voices of many different female Murdoch scholars to create a wall of sound that should be really beautiful.

This will involve recording yourself reading the poem using a free software that can be downloaded to most computers or as a voice note if you have a high-quality microphone on your smartphone. We will need you to complete a recording and submit a release form by mid-August.
